India and The World

Constitution Day celebrated on 26th November to mark 69th anniversary of adoption of Constitution



The Constitution Day of India (or Samvidhan Diwas) is observed every year on 26th November to mark the anniversary of adoption of Constitution and also spread awareness of Indian Constitution. On this day in 1949, constitution of India was adopted and came into force on January 26, 1950. Union Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment (MSJE) is nodal Ministry for the celebration of Constitution Day. This year it was third edition of the Constitution Day (69th anniversary of adoption of Constitution) after it was instituted in October 2015 as part of year-long nationwide celebrations of 125th birth Anniversary of Dr. B R Ambedkar, Chairman of the Drafting Committee of Constituent Assembly.

Sangai Tourism festival held in Manipur



The annual Sangai Festival was celebrated in northeastern state of Manipur (November 22). It is grandest festival of state named after state animal, Sangai, the critically endangered brown-antlered deer found only in Manipur. The festival aims to promote Manipur as world class tourism destination. It was inaugurated by Union Defence Minister Nirmala Sitharaman.

World Diabetes Day : 14 November

World Diabetes Day was observed every year across the world on 14 November to raise awareness about diabetes. Observance of day aims to pursue multilateral efforts to promote and improve human health and provide access to health-care treatment and education. The theme for World Diabetes Day 2018 and 2019 is "The Family and Diabetes". The two-year theme timeframe has been chosen to arise awareness of the impact that diabetes has on the family and support network of those affected and promote role of family in management, care, prevention and education of diabetes.

Kim Jong-Yang of South Korea elected as New President of Interpol



Kim Jong Yang of South Korea was elected Interpol President for two-year term by member countries at 87th General Assembly of Interpol, held for first time in Dubai. He secured at least two-thirds of votes cast at general assembly and defeated Russia's Alexander Prokopchuk. He will serve until 2020, completing the four-year mandate of his predecessor, Meng Hongwei, who was detained in China over corruption charges.

ISRO successfully launches communication satellite GSAT-29



Communication satellite GSAT-29 was launched (November 15) successfully by the second developmental flight of Geosynchronous Satellite Launch Vehicle Mark III (GSLV MKIII-D2) from the Satish Dhawan Space Centre (SDSC) SHAR, Sriharikota. Communication satellite GSAT-29 weighing 3,423 kg is a multiband and multi-beam satellite. The mission life will be 10 years.

Next Credit Card : IndusInd Bank Launches First Interactive Credit Card in India with Buttons



IndusInd Bank has launched first interactive Credit Card in India with buttons called IndusInd Bank Next Credit Card. It will give customer multiple options on how to make a payment using his or her Credit Card. This Card has been created in partnership with Pittsburgh USA headquartered Dynamics Inc., which designs and manufactures intelligent, battery powered payment cards.

Mohammed VI-B : Morocco launches its second earth observation satellite



Morocco successfully launched its second earth observation satellite named Mohammed VI-B on board of Arianespace Vega rocket from launch pad at Guiana Space Center in Kourou, French Guiana in South America on November 22, 2018. It will be placed at same orbit as its twin satellite Mohammed 6-A, the first Moroccan satellite launched in November 2017 also on Vega rocket. The launch completes Morocco's two-satellite constellation for Earth observation.

Andaman & Nicobar Islands home to tenth of India's fauna species : ZSI

Andaman & Nicobar Islands are home to tenth of India's fauna species and hosts 1,067 endemic faunal species found nowhere else. It was revealed by Zoological Survey of India (ZSI) publication titled Faunal Diversity of Biogeographic Zones: Islands of India. This publication for the first time has come up with database of all faunal species found on the island.

It has database of species found in particular category of animals and also highlights most vulnerable among them.



India overtakes US to become 2nd Largest Smartphone market behind China

According to research firm Canalis, India has overtaken US to become second largest smartphone market in the July-September 2018 quarter. India saw shipment of 40.4 million units during third quarter and was second to China where 100.6 million smartphones were shipped. Smartphone shipment in US was at 40 million units.

Bangladesh enacts Digital Security Bill, 2018



Bangladesh's President Abdul Hamid has given his assent controversial Digital Security Bill, 2018, by enacting it as a law. This new law combines previous colonial-era Official Secrets Act with tough new provisions such as arrests without warrant. Bangladesh Government led by Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina (Bangladesh Awami League) has defended the digital law as necessary to combat cyber crime.

CCEA approves Atmosphere & Climate Research-Modelling Observing Systems and Services (ACROSS) scheme

Prime Minister Narendra Modi chaired Cabinet Committee of Economic Affairs (CCEA) has approved continuation of nine sub-schemes of umbrella scheme "Atmosphere & Climate Research-Modelling Observing Systems & Services (ACROSS)" during 2017-2020. The scheme aims at improving skill of weather and climate forecast through sustained observations, intensive Research & Development.

Athlete Hima Das appointed first Youth Ambassador of UNICEF India



India's ace sprinter and Asian Games gold-medallist sprinter Hima Das was appointed as first ever youth ambassador of United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) India. UNICEF India works with central government to ensure that each child born in country gets best start in life, thrives and develops to his or her full potential.

Sameer Verma wins Syed Modi International Badminton title 2018

India's Sameer Verma has won Syed Modi India Grand Prix Gold badminton title 2018 in men's singles category. In the final match held in Lucknow, he defeated China's Lu Guangzu by 16-21, 21-19 and 21-14 score. Women's singles title was won by China's Han Yue after defeating India's Saina Nehwal by 21-18, 21-8 score.

Sunil Arora appointed as new Chief Election Commissioner

President Ram Nath Kovind appointed senior IAS officer Sunil Arora as the new Chief Election Commissioner (CEC). He will be the 23rd CEC and shall succeed O.P. Rawat who retires in December 2018. He will have nearly two-and-a-half-year tenure as CEC and General Election 2019 will be conducted under his stewardship.

Vertical Garden : An Old school solution to current problems



Vertical Garden is one of those methods which has grown rapidly to tackle pollution related problems and at the same time provide a visual impact. Across the globe, companies are tapping into this technology to turn the dense urban cities with adequate plant growth to curb air pollution and make the city beautiful.

What is a Vertical Garden?

Vertical garden is a unique technique that allows us to grow plants on a suspended panel that is vertically placed by using hydroponics. These structures can either be attached to the wall or be self-supporting.

This concept isn't new, as Vertical Gardens have been around since ancient civilizations. Lack of trees, lack of land space, increasing pollution levels and rising temperatures has today necessitated the need for more and more vertical gardens to add a pop of nature around our concrete jungles.

Vertical gardens are known by many different names, living walls, live walls and moss walls.

Where Can A Vertical Garden Be Placed?

While potted plants can practically be placed anywhere, the options with vertical garden are endless too. Today, vertical gardens can be seen in major corporation headquarters, in hotel lobbies, and even in small residential backyards. These gardens not only look impressive but also add a level of comfort to the environment by tapping into nature's inherent calming powers.

A vertical garden is a wonderful alternative to potted plants. Since vertical gardens are planted on one single panel they do not eat up or demand a lot of place, also these are easy to maintain and at the same time, they add a lush pop of color to any environment.



How Does It Work?

Vertical Garden is constructed just like the actual walls, these have a skeletal structure which is hung with several sections containing the plants and flowers which ultimately make up the garden. But, how these walls function, well, it depends on the kind of system installed. Few systems come along with hidden pipes which provide a mechanism for self-watering which helps in keeping the plants healthy, but there are other systems which demand hand-watering too.



Benefits of A Vertical Garden :

1. Visual Benefits

They can create a breath-taking statement by producing an alluring and inviting environment. The inhabitants are always greeted by a lush green environment, it also creates a soothing effect of being around plenty of foliage. Also, these walls work as a natural air-filtration system, which means more fresh air to breathe, basically these walls are purveyors of good health and healthy minds.



2. Credits/Sustainability

The installation of vertical gardens can earn buildings credits from recognized Green building certifiers like LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design), and IGBC (Indian Green Building Council). More points mean improved carbon footprint and increased property values.

3. Improved Air Quality

A vertical green wall is a natural air-filter, it helps in the creation of a cleaner and invigorating environment which helps to enhance the occupant's health and productivity. Considering a typical office environment, where the workers are exposed to harmful air toxins like carbon monoxide, formaldehyde, Benzene and VOCs, a vertical garden in such an environment can break down harmful toxins while releasing fresh oxygen into the workplace air.

4. Energy Cost Reduction

Both the interior and exterior vertical green walls by a process called "evapotranspiration" cool the air in the hotter summer months. During the winter months, it adds to the building insulation consequently reducing energy costs required for the heating of the building. Exterior vertical garden can reduce the wall surface temperatures by nearly 50 degrees °F, this can help in significant energy savings.

5. Noise Level Reduction

One lesser known benefit of a vertical garden, these structures can reduce noise levels in buildings. Across the world, plants are being used to reduce the noise levels along roads and highways. Vertical gardens can expand on this idea as vegetation 'naturally' blocks high-frequency sounds. These walls act as an extra insulation with a layer of air between the plants and the wall. Additionally, they can reduce noise levels by refracting, reflecting, and also by absorbing acoustic energy.



6. Lack Of Dependence On Land

Just as the name suggests, everything grows upwards rather than getting spanned horizontally. Vertical gardens rely on racks and can be effectively built as a tower which means no need to invest in elusive land areas.

7. Less Overhead Costs

In terms of water usage, a vertical farm consumes 90% less water than the traditional gardens, this is because water is constantly harvested and reused. But, bigger savings come in the form of labor. Huge lavish garden settings demand a lot of manpower to maintain it, but with vertical gardens, only one skilled professional can do the job of monitoring the plants and ensuring that all the parameters are correct.

8. Shields Building Structure

Buildings get adversely affected by fluctuating temperatures which causes materials to contract and expand, which over time results in deterioration, fissures, and cracks. Having exterior vertical gardens protect buildings not just from temperature fluctuations but also diverts water away from walls when it's raining heavily and also provides protection from harmful UV radiation.



How Do Vertical Gardens Help The Environment?

With the industrial revolution and modern advancements, air pollution levels have gone drastically high. Today, built-up areas have negligible number of plants and our air is filled with poisoning gases and particulate matter. Vertical Garden is an amazing way to utilize nature to reverse the impairment we are causing to the environment.

Vertical Gardens help the environment exactly in the same way a normal horizontally placed garden does. Plants play a huge role in cleaning the air, they help to reduce noise pollution as they possess noise reduction capabilities. Another important function of the plants is to reduce the amount of carbon monoxide in the air and filter out the pollutants by breathing them in and then exchanging them for clean, fresh, clear oxygen.

Coming to noise reduction, for long plants have been used to reduce noise levels on raucous roads and highways across the globe. Vertical gardens expand on this idea, as vegetation naturally helps in blocking high-frequency sounds. The use of vertical gardens could significantly change the urban environments by eradicating the noise of the hustle and bustle we have actually adapted to.

Vertical gardens can be fitted to both refurbishments and new builds, from small independent houses to huge commercial developments. These are totally versatile and can be installed both inside and outside the building structures.



DEMYSTIFYING SCIENCE

UNKNOWN FACTS

1. When you look into the night sky, you are looking back in time

The stars we see in the night sky are very far away from us, so far the star light we see has taken a long time to travel across space to reach our eyes. This means whenever we look out into the night and gaze at stars we are actually experiencing how they looked in the past. For example, the bright star Vega is relatively close to us at 25 light-years away, so the light we see left the star 25 years ago; while Betelgeuse (pictured) in the constellation of Orion is 640 light-years away, so the light left the star around 1370, during the time of the Hundred Years' War between England and France. Other stars we see are further away still, so we are seeing them much deeper in their past.



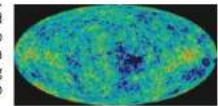
2. The Hubble telescope allows us to look back billions of years into the past

The Hubble Telescope enables us to look towards very distant objects in the universe. Thanks to this remarkable piece of engineering NASA has been able to create some incredible images, one of which is the Hubble Ultra Deep Field. Created using images from the telescope from 2003 and 2004, the incredible picture displays a tiny patch of the sky in immense detail; it contains 10,000 objects, most of them young galaxies, and acts as a portal back in time. In one picture we are transported 13 billion years into the past, just 400 to 800 million years after the Big Bang, which is early in terms of the universe's history.



3. You can watch the Big Bang on your television

Cosmic background radiations are the afterglow and heat of the Big Bang, the momentous event that kick-started our universe 13.7 billion years ago. This cosmic echo exists throughout the universe, and amazingly we can use an old-fashioned television set to catch a glimpse of it. When a television is not tuned to a station you can see the black and white fuzz and clacking white noise, around 1% of this interference is made up cosmic background radiation the afterglow of creation.



4. It takes 225 million years for our Sun to travel around the galaxy

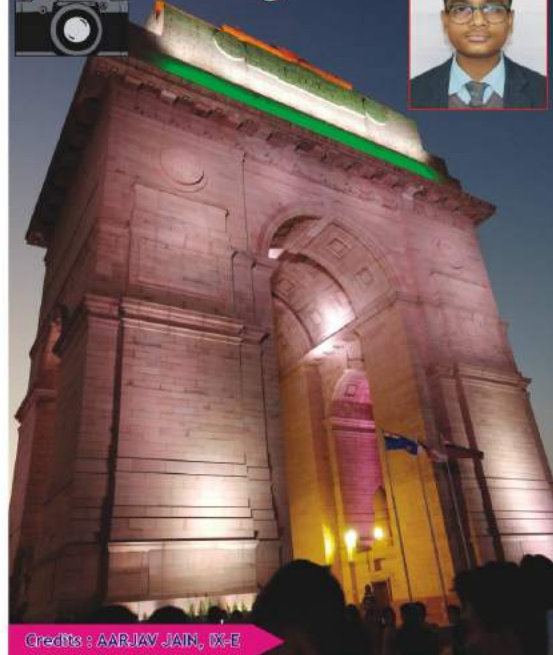
Whilst the Earth and the other planets within our solar system orbit around the Sun, the Sun itself is orbiting around the centre of our galaxy, the Milky Way. It takes the Sun 225 million years to perform a complete circuit of the galaxy. The last time the Sun was in its current position in the galaxy the super-continent Pangaea was just about starting to break apart and early dinosaurs were making an appearance.



5. It is estimated there are 400 billion stars in our galaxy

Our Sun is essential to us, the centre of our Solar System, and our source of light and energy, but it is just one of many, many stars that make up our home galaxy, the Milky Way. Current estimates suggest there are around 400 billion stars sharing our galaxy.

B.Sc. in Statistics

In recent years, "Statistics" has come among as one of the best choices among students to choose as their career. "Statistics is a term which relates to the study of the analysis, collection, presentation and organization of Numerical Data. Statistics can interpret aggregates of data which are too large to be understood by ordinary observation". Bachelor of Science in Statistics or B.Sc. Statistics is a 3-year undergraduate course in Statistics, Probability and Permutations.

Eligibility

BSc(H) Statistics requires 4 subjects which should include- Mathematics studied at +2 level, a Language subject and Two core subjects (which can be Physics and Chemistry if the **Student** is from Science Background OR Economics, Business Studies, Accounts, if the **student** is from **Commerce** Background).The candidate must pass in Class 12th with minimum Aggregate of 50% with Mathematics as one of the subjects from a Recognized School in India. The **Admission Process** may vary for different Institutes. In some colleges, the Admission is merit-based whereas in other colleges, Entrance exams for the respective course are conducted for Admission.

- Strong Foundation in Mathematical Statistics
- Ability to Interact with peoples from various fields to understand the problems
- Ability to stay updated on recent literature & statistical software
- Logical Thinking & Ability to comprehend key facts
- Strong Background in Statistical Computing
- Versatility in solving problem

Who Moved My Cheese?

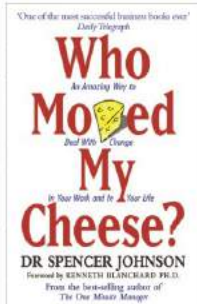

मोक्षपट्टम अर्थात् साँप सीढ़ी : संत ज्ञानेश्वर की देन

शायद ही कोई ऐसा व्यक्ति हो जिसने कभी बचपन में साँप सीढ़ी का खेल न खेला हो। स्कूल/कॉलेज की छुट्टियों के समय लूंडे और साँप सीढ़ी का खेल प्रायः घर में बच्चे खेलते दिखाई देते हैं। सामान्यतः यह धारणा है कि यह खेल विदेश से आया है परंतु वास्तविकता यह है कि यह खेल विदेशों की नहीं बल्कि भारत की ही देन है और इसका जैसा रूप आज हमारे सामने है, यह इसका बदला हुआ रूप है।

प्राचीन भारत में इस खेल को 'मोक्षपट्टम' के नाम से जाना जाता था। लोगों का मानना है कि महाराष्ट्र के संत ज्ञानेश्वर ने इस खेल को बनाया था। इसे ज्ञान चौपड़ या 'परमपद सोपान' भी कहा गया है।

11^{वीं} सदी आते-आते यह खेल इंग्लैंड पहुँच गया। वहाँ इसे 'स्नेक्स एंड लेडर्स' कह कर प्रचारित किया। डिपार्टमेंट ऑफ क्रॉस कल्चर एंड रीजनल स्टडीज के पीएच०डी० के शोधकर्ता जैकब श्वेत मैडसन ने मोक्षपट्टम खेल पर काफी तथ्य जुटाए। उन्होंने भारत के शहरों में घूम-घूमकर कपड़े और कागज पर निर्मित मोक्षपट्टम और बोर्ड गेम के दो सौ से अधिक नमूने एकत्रित किए हैं। इसमें सर्वाधिक पुराना मोक्षपट्टम 17^{वीं} शताब्दी का है और इसकी सबसे ज़्यादा प्रतियाँ गुजरात और राजस्थान में मिली हैं।

इस खेल को बनाने का मुख्य उद्देश्य बच्चों को सत्कर्म और सद्गर्भ की शिक्षा देना था। सीढ़ियों अच्छे कर्म को दर्शाती थीं, वहीं साँप हमारे बुरे कर्मों को दर्शाते थे। हमारे अच्छे कर्म हमें सी के करीब ले जाते हैं जिसका अर्थ था—मोक्ष वही बुरे कर्म हमें दोबारा जन्म लेने पर मजबूर करते हैं। पुराने खेल में साँपों की संख्या कीड़े-मकोड़े के रूप में होती थी। इससे यह मजबूर करते हैं। पुराने अच्छाई का रास्ता बुरे सीढ़ियों से अधिक दर्शाया गया था कि है। इस खेल में सीढ़ियों रास्ते से काफी कठिन करती है जबकि साँप शाप वरदानों का प्रतिनिधित्व मनुष्य को अपना जीवन कैसे या अगुणों को दर्शाते हैं। खेले का माध्यम से बताया गया है।
