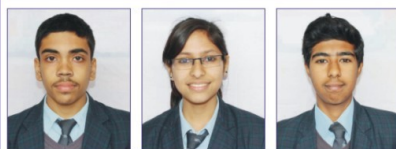

India and The World

Nepal's first ever satellite launched into space



Nepal's first satellite has been launched into space, which will soon start rotating around the Earth's orbit to collect information about the country's topography and Earth's magnetic field. The NepaliSat-1 was launched from the Virginia-based station of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in the US. The satellite, developed by two Nepalis -- Abhas Maskey and Hariram Shrestha -- at Japan's Kyushu Institute of Technology, bears the Nepal flag and the NAST logo. According to the NAST, the satellite is equipped with a 5MP camera to capture Nepal's topography and a magnetometer to collect data related to the Earth's magnetic field. The total cost from developing the satellite to launching it and constructing the ground station was said to be 20 million Nepalese rupees (\$179,915).

Mithali Raj named goodwill ambassador for Street Child Cricket World Cup



Indian women's cricket team captain Mithali Raj has been named the goodwill ambassador of Team India at the Street Child Cricket World Cup (SCWC). She, alongside Sourav Ganguly and Rajasthan Royals, joins in supporting the team as they gear up for the final match at Lords, just ahead of the ICC Cricket World Cup in May this year. Mithali said that she was happy to join the Street Child Cricket World Cup as a goodwill ambassador for Team India.

NASA's TESS Exoplanet Mission Finds 1st Earth-Size Alien World



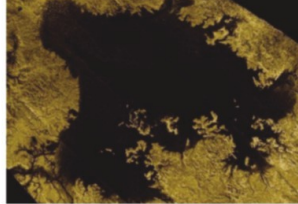
NASA's newest planet hunter has discovered its first Earth-size alien world. The Transiting Exoplanet Survey Satellite (TESS) spotted the planet, as well as a weird "sub-Neptune" world, circling the star HD 21749, which lies about 53 light-years from Earth. It circles its host star very tightly, completing one orbit every 7.8 Earth days, and is therefore probably quite hot. This exoplanet, known as HD 21749b, is about 23 times heavier than Earth and 2.7 times wider than our home world. Those numbers suggest HD 21749b is gaseous rather than rocky. The exoplanet's surface temperature probably hovers around 300 degrees Fahrenheit (150 degrees Celsius). That newly confirmed neighbor, HD 21749c, appears to be about the same size as Earth, but its mass is tough to nail down at present.

Unique oil-eating bacteria found in world's deepest ocean trench



Scientists have discovered a type of unique oil-eating bacteria in the Mariana Trench, the deepest part of the Earth's oceans, a finding that may pave the way for sustainable ways to clean up oil spills. These types of microorganisms eat compounds similar to those in oil and then use it for fuel. This bacteria is abundant at the bottom of the Mariana Trench. It was found that the proportion of hydrocarbon degrading bacteria in the Trench is the highest on Earth.

Lakes filled with liquid methane spotted on Saturn's moon Titan



Titan and Earth are the solar system's two places with standing bodies of liquid on the surface. Titan boasts lakes, rivers and seas of hydrocarbons: compounds of hydrogen and carbon like those that are the main components of petroleum and natural gas. These liquid lakes more than 300 feet deep comprise mainly of methane. The findings represented further evidence about Titan's hydrological cycle, with liquid hydrocarbons raining down from clouds, flowing across its surface and evaporating back into the sky. Titan, with a diameter of 5,150 km, is the solar system's second largest moon, behind only Jupiter's Ganymede. It is bigger than the planet Mercury. Titan is the most Earth-like body in the solar system. It has lakes, canyons, rivers, dune fields of organic sand particles about the same size as silica sand grains on Earth.

NGT forms Central Monitoring Committee to check river pollution



To check river pollution, National Green Tribunal has constituted a Central Monitoring Committee to undertake a national initiative by way of preparation and enforcement of a national plan to make river stretches pollution free, comprising a senior representative of NITI Aayog, secretaries Ministry of Water Resources, Ministry of Urban Development, Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, Director General, National Mission for Clean Ganga and chairman CPCB. Chairman CPCB will be the nodal authority for coordination. 351 polluted river stretches have been noted by the CPCB and 117 such stretches are in the states of Assam, Gujarat, and Maharashtra.

He inspected an impressive parade led by Parade Commander Deputy Superintendent of Police Shakti Singh. Contingents of state police, home guards, NCC cadets, Bharat Scouts and Guides participated in the parade. Various other functions were also held at district and sub-divisional headquarters.

Speaking in Shimla, the governor said it was a matter of great pride that the tiny hill-state developed rapidly after coming into existence on April 15, 1948 following the merger of 30 princely states. The governor also expressed concern on the issue of drug addiction. A colorful cultural programme was presented by students and a small skit was also performed by the District Election Department to make people aware about the importance of voting.

Israel's President Formally Nominates Benjamin Netanyahu as Prime Minister



Israel's president has formally nominated Benjamin Netanyahu for a fourth consecutive term as prime minister. In one of the president's few non-ceremonial roles, President Reuven Rivlin tasked Netanyahu on Wednesday, 17 April, with assembling a governing coalition within 42 days.

Meena Kumari Maisnam clinches 54kg Gold Medal; Sakshi, Pwilo Basumatary bag Silver

Meena Kumari Maisnam clinched the gold medal in the 54 kg category to cap her fine run at the Boxing World Cup in Cologne. Sakshi (57kg) and Pwilo Basumatary (64kg) lost



their final bouts and had to settle for silver while Pinki Rani (51kg) and Parveen (60kg) won bronze as India finished with five medals. India Open gold medallist Basumatary gave her best but came up short against China's Chengyu Yang, who was declared winner on points.

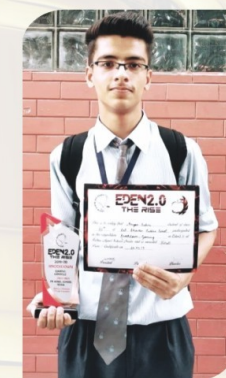

MANAGE YOUR WASTE FOR A BETTER TOMORROW



Green Corner

India is a country with a population of over 1.5 billion people and some of the cities in India have population more than some countries. So it is obvious that cities with this much of population will generate a lot of waste. If we look at numbers, India generates around 60 million tons of garbage every single day and almost 75% of the garbage are dumped untreated in the landfills. If we the citizens will not take necessary steps to manage this waste then one day India will need 1240 hectares of land which is size of a metropolitan city to dump the waste.

So let us take a look at 5 step guide on how to reduce the waste generated.

Do Away With Plastic

The menace of plastic pollution is not only an alarming issue but is also a bigger threat than nuclear weapons, as one plastic bottle takes upto 1000 years to decompose itself. Plastic, when dumped into landfills release harmful greenhouse gases.

The only solution is to junk plastic and look for alternatives. For instance, substitute plastic cups and plastic pens with paper cups and vintage ink pens respectively. Ditch plastic straws, instead sip your drinks. To make nine plastic bags it takes as much as energy as driving a car for one kilometre. Besides, plastic bags are harmful for the environment. So for the next shopping expedition, replace plastic bag with a mesh bag that comes with a drawstring or a cloth bag. Denim bags are a great way to reuse old or worn out jeans.



Adopt Composting

Composting can reduce household waste generation by 30 per cent. Composting is also beneficial for plant growth as it provides many essential nutrients for them and it can also be used as fertilizer. It is believed that a family of 4 can easily reduce their waste from 1000 Kg to less than 100 kg every year if they adopt segregation and composting.



Segregate Waste

Simply start by getting colour coated bins. Differentiate the bins into following: Green for organic, yellow for glass, white for paper, grey for metal, red for hazard and blue for plastic. Segregate waste into two categories - Bio Degradable and Non-Bio-Degradable.

Put wet wastes like leftover foods, vegetables, peels etc. in an organic dustbin which can later be used for composting. Segregation of waste can reduce the garbage burden on the already overflowing landfills, thereby curbing the pollution levels.



Go Paperless

Papers account for almost 35 per cent of the waste that is dumped in landfills. From paper cups to napkins everything ends up in landfills from the trash can. To reduce paper waste, start using old clothes like rags for cleaning around the house, instead of paper towels. Switch to hand towels from paper napkins in your kitchen. Avoid using paper plates in house parties.



Adopt 3 R's

A simple way of contributing to waste management is to adopt the 3 R's - Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. Landfills across India are overloaded and it has to be managed.

Re-purposing your household trash is a good way to reduce waste. For example, instead of throwing the plastic bottles use them to decorate your house and make other DIY plastic showpieces. Switch to items that can be refilled like printer cartridges or glue, reuse plastic folders. Use old wood and pallets to build compost bins.

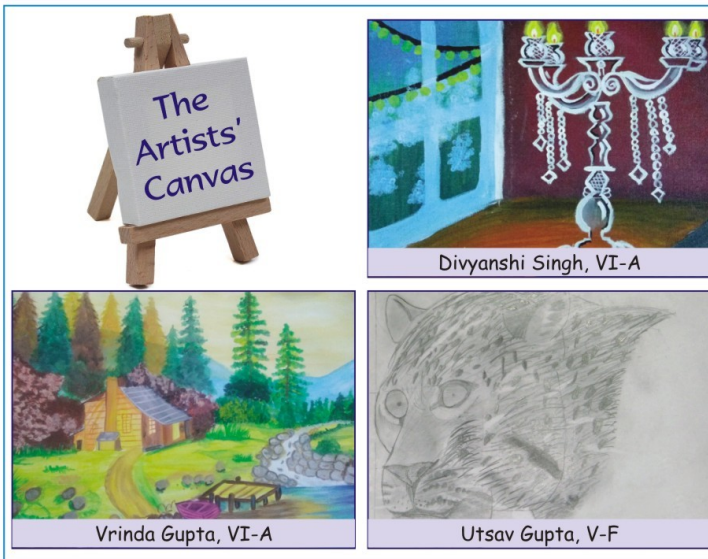
WILL OF INDIA : SKILL INDIA WORKSHOP ON INTRODUCTION OF SKILL COURSES

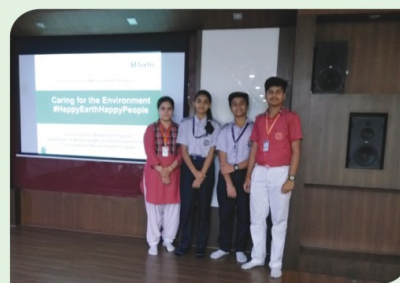
Workshop on Eco-Psychology

All in all it was a comprehensive session. The students and teachers learnt a lot from the wholesome discourse.



DREAM DREAM DREAM!!!!



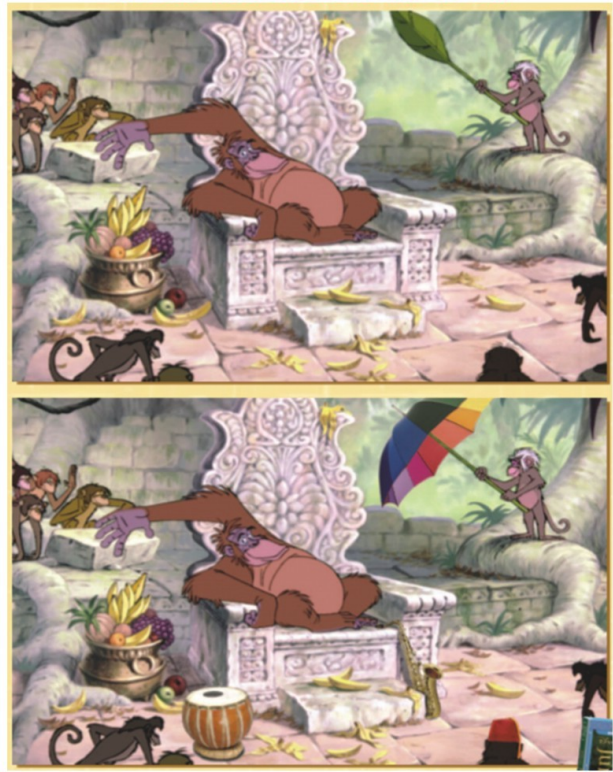
